



FESTIVAL DIRECTORS' BIOGRAPHIES




FESTIVAL CHOIR DIRECTOR

MARK STOVER

Regarded as a leading conductor and pedagogue in the U.S. and abroad, Mark Stover shares his passion for people and building community through pursuing the highest levels of artistry. He joined the **University of Michigan** in 2018 as associate director of choirs, conducting the **Men's Glee Club** and the **University Choir**, teaching undergraduate conducting, and serving as the conductor of the **Michigan Youth Chamber Singers**.

Stover came to Ann Arbor from Northfield, Minnesota, home of Saint Olaf College, where he served on the music faculty as conductor of the St. Olaf Chapel Choir (SATB) and Viking Chorus (TTBB) while teaching conducting and a new course he designed titled "Music and Social Justice." Additionally, Stover served for multiple seasons as the artistic director of Magnum Chorum, a semi-professional choral ensemble of over 60 voices based in Minneapolis-St. Paul. Magnum Chorum was a featured ensemble in the 2017 ACDA National Conference in the Raymond C. Brock Commission performance under the baton of Robert Spano.

Stover has been featured as a conductor and pedagogue throughout the United States and abroad and has led ensembles in Ukraine, and France. In the Fall of 2018, Stover led major concerts and performances in Rome, Italy as the co-artistic director of the **Together In Hope Project**. He is the former R&R chair of music in worship for **ACDA** of Minnesota, and in the summer of 2018 acted as lead faculty coordinator for the biennial St. Olaf Conference on Worship, Theology, and the Arts. Stover holds degrees from **St. Olaf College** and **Luther Seminary**, where he studied conducting and choral repertoire under the mentorship of **Dr. Anton Armstrong** and **Dr. Paul Westermeyer.**



FESTIVAL BAND DIRECTOR


JUAN TONY GUZMAN

A conductor, composer, arranger, and music educator from the Dominican Republic, professor Juan Tony Guzmán is director of the **Luther College Jazz Orchestra** and **Jazz Program**, and holds the **Weston Noble Endowed Chair in Music**.

Guzmán is a sought-after conductor of all-state and honor choirs, concert bands, jazz bands, and symphony orchestras across the United States. He frequently serves as a guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator at festivals across North America, Central and South America, Europe, Asia, and the Middle East. Guzmán has recently done clinics and presentations for the Singapore American School, The Choral Music Experience, Association for Music in International Schools, Universidade Federal da Paraíba and the Universidade Federal do Rio Grande do Norte in Brazil, World Choral Symposium, the Scottish Association for Music Education, and the Festival 500 in Canada.

An active arranger, Guzmán is known for his choral arrangements of Caribbean and Latin American music, some of which are published by **Boosey & Hawkes and Oxford University Press.**

Guzmán holds a Ph.D. in music education, a certificate in pedagogy of music theory, and a master's degree in music education from Florida State University. He has a bachelor of arts in music education from Luther College and a degree in electromechanical engineering from the Universidad Católica Madre y Maestra in Santiago, Dominican Republic.



FESTIVAL ORCHESTRA DIRECTOR

WILLIAM WIEDRICH

William W. Wiedrich is in constant demand as a guest conductor and clinician. He currently is **Director of Orchestral Studies** at the **University of South Florida**, Tampa, where he conducts the **USF Symphony Orchestra** and **Opera Theatre**, and maintains a large conducting studio. Wiedrich is also **Music Director** of the **Tampa Metropolitan Youth Orchestra**. His youth orchestra has appeared twice in **Carnegie Hall** and has maintained an active commissioning program of music for young orchestras. He frequently serves as an **All-State conductor**, most recently in Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, and Michigan.

Most recently, Wiedrich was invited by the Jinsha Summer Music Festival, in association with China's Sichuan Conservatory, to serve as a guest conductor and primary conducting instructor to both Chinese and American conservatory students. In addition, Wiedrich has served as guest conductor at the Interlochen Arts Academy.

He has appeared on numerous compact disc recordings as conductor and producer, most recently on the Albany, Blue Griffin, Capstone, and Koch labels.

He currently serves as **Artistic Director of the Music, Etc. Chamber Arts Collective**, a professional chamber ensemble dedicated to advancing new music into a permanent repertory. Wiedrich has worked closely with composers such as Louis Andriessen, Augusta Read Thomas, Karel Husa, and Robert Maggio. His ensembles have premiered over 28 works at the **University of South Florida** and with the **TMYO program**.

Wiedrich previously served as faculty at Michigan State University, East Carolina University, and as visiting faculty at the University of Michigan, where he later earned his Doctoral degree. His primary teachers include Gustav Meier, H. Robert Reynolds, Larry Racheff, and also Gunther Schuller at the Festival at Sandpoint. Wiedrich also attended the conducting seminar at Tanglewood.

PIANO ADJUDICATORS AND MASTERCLASS LEADERS



Lim Yan

2006 National Arts Council Young Artist Award recipient Lim Yan was a student of **David Hartigan** at **Chetham's School of Music in Manchester**, **UK**, and subsequently graduated from the **University of Manchester and the Royal Northern College of Music** under the tutelage of **Ronan O'Hora**.

After placing first in the Piano Open category in the 1997 National Piano and Violin Competition, Yan's competition results in Europe – including 1st at the 2001 Karic International Piano Competition – led to concert engagements across Europe and Asia. He gave two recitals at the Cheltenham Festival and also worked with the China Radio-Film Symphony Orchestra at the Beijing International Piano Festival. When the Singapore National Youth Orchestra was invited to the 2011 Aberdeen International Youth Festival, he was the soloist in Prokofiev's Piano Concerto No. 2. Nearer home, Yan has appeared with the Singapore Symphony Orchestra several times in concerto performances, and also collaborated with the Orchestra of the Music Makers as well as re:Sound. Together with The Philharmonic Orchestra, he completed a cycle of all five Beethoven Piano Concertos and the Triple Concerto over three concerts in June 2012.

Besides his solo and concerto performances, Yan is a highly sought-after collaborative pianist and chamber musician, having worked together successfully with many leading musicians – for instance, violinist Ning Feng and cellist Wang Jian. His current chamber groups include a piano trio, as well as the established piano quintet series **Take 5** which is well into their second decade.



Frank DeMeglio

Frank is a classical music teacher, lecturer and writer. Having taught part time at **LASALLE** since 2003, he joined the faculty in 2009. Of particular interest to Frank is the efficient technical approach to the keyboard that aligns with sound biomechanical principles, especially with respect to injury prevention and cure.

He studied piano at the **University of Michigan** and earned a **Bachelor's degree in performance**. After graduating, he taught with **Randy and Nancy Faber**, authors of the best-selling Piano Adventures library of piano books. He returned to the University of Michigan fo an **MBA in marketing** in 1992, and was hired by **Steinway & Sons** as their **New York Institutional Sales Representative**. While working for Steinway & Sons, part of his duties included managing the famed Steinway Selection Room of concert and studio grand pianos.

In 2002, Frank moved to Singapore where he wrote classical music reviews for the **Business Times** from 2001 to 2004. He continues to guest review (including for the **2007 Singapore International Piano Festival**) and his interviews of international pedagogues and performers appear in print and on the web.

Frank's performing career included recitals in Spain and Japan, where he recorded a special-release CD in honour of the **15th anniversary of the UNESCO** chapter of **Narita City, Japan.**

CHORAL ADJUDICATORS



Joel Navarro

Transplanted to Singapore in 2014, Dr. Joel Navarro is currently Lecturer and Professor of Music at the Singapore Bible College's School of Church Music. There he teaches major courses in choral conducting in Master of Church Music and directs the SBC Canticorum. Previously, he taught at Calvin College (Michigan) for twelve years as a tenured professor of music. Earlier, he served sixteen years as an assistant professor and one-time Chair of the Choral Conducting Department at the University of the Philippines College of Music. Currently, he is lead lecturer and program consultant for the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting at St Paul University in Manila, and the Master of Ministry in Worship and Music Leadership major in Choral Conducting in Bandung Theological Seminary.

He was known internationally as the former conductor of the **Ateneo de Manila University Glee Club** which amassed a string of top prizes in European choral competitions during his 22-year tenure. He is a frequent jury member for many choral competitions, choir and solo voice adjudications.

To his conducting students, he is a beloved mentor and a fastidious enabler of his students in expanding their influence as servant-leaders, collaborative artists, and interdisciplinary scholars. Passionate about composition, integration of faith and learning, and intersections of indigeneity in modernity, Dr. Navarro continues to write and arrange hymns, anthems, art, concert, and worship music for professional, university, community, and church choirs. His choral compositions are published by Musica Manila, GIA Publications, and Adoro Music Publishing. He is frequently invited to do workshops on conducting, choral music, worship. During his university days, they won the grand prize in a nationwide singing competition in the Philippines.



Eudenice Palaruan

Eudenice Palaruan studied Conducting at the University of the Philippines College of Music and Berlin Church Music School in Germany. He was the assistant choirmaster of the Philippine Madrigal Singers. He is currently an associate professor at the School of Church Music in Singapore Bible College and the choral director of the Singapore Symphony Chorus.



Kristin Symes

Kristin Symes, a native of Wisconsin, USA, has been noted for her "silvery, soft, almost soubrette-like soprano" tone. She is a graduate of **Luther College** where she received cum laude in voice and music education and studied under **Dr. David Judisch, Dr. Jessica Paul,** and **Weston Noble.** In Singapore, she has continued her studies with **Ms. Alexandra Novicova.**

Ms. Symes was a prize winner in the International Delphic Games in Russia, the Zhongsin International Music Competition and most recently invited to perform in the winner's concert at Carnegie Hall, New York City, winning Gold First Prize in the Prima Artists Music Competition.

Ms. Symes' remarkable versatility enables her to produce compelling performances of both operatic and oratorio repertoire. Most recently, she sang with **L'Arietta Opera** in the contemporary triple bill show **Operacalypse Now** as principal soprano roles. She made her professional operatic debut in the role of **Musetta** with the **Singapore Lyric Opera's 2010** production of **La Boheme.** Other roles include, **Anna from Die Fledermaus** and **Valencienne from The Merry Widow**. Equally successful as a concert singer, Ms. Symes has been soprano soloist in such works as **Haydn's Nelson Mass**, **Mozart's Vesperae solennes de Confessore**, **Faure's Requiem**, **Handel's Messiah**, **Mozart's Requiem**, and **Rutter's Magnificat.** Ms. Symes performed a World Premiere work by Singaporean Composer **Mr. Lee Yuk Chuan** at the **Victoria Concert Hall** May 2016.

As well as being a vocalist, Ms. Symes is currently the **Middle School Choir Director** at **Singapore American School** and has adjudicated vocal competitions, held masterclasses and conducted choirs and orchestras at international and local schools and universities. Ms. Symes lives in Singapore with her Australian husband Josh and two children, Lucy and Oliver. Besides music being her passion, she enjoys spending time with her family and learning more about nutrition, health and aromatherapy.

Rebecca Watters

Some of Rebecca Watters' earliest memories are related to classical music. From wearing out the "belly dancer 8-track" at Grandma's house (Sheherezade: Stokowsy & Royal Philharmonic, 1976) to jotting down in crayon the titles of pieces she heard on public radio (Vaughan Williams: Serenade to Music), Rebecca's ears have always been wide open and keenly focused on classical music.

Training in classical piano and Horn have given her invaluable experience in understanding the musician's perspective which drives her every experience on the podium. Rebecca earned a **Bachelor's in Music** from **Murray State University** in Kentucky, and a **Master's in Education** from **George Mason University** in Virginia. Her further studies have included conducting with **Peter Stark** in the UK, and Horn with **Jamie Hersch** in Singapore.

A native Tennessean, Rebecca has taught music in overseas International Schools since 2001. Her career path has taken her across the US, and around the world, first as a classical music radio host in Kentucky and Maryland, a pre-school and music teacher in Shanghai, and presently a music teacher and conductor at **Singapore American School**, the largest single-campus international school in the world.



Sam Armstrong

Born and raised in Los Angeles, Sam Armstrong began his studies at age 12 with Byron Peebles and James Miller of the Los Angeles Philharmonic. In 2008, he continued his education as a student of Joseph Alessi at The Juilliard School, receiving the Jerome L. Greene Fellowship. While in New York, Sam had the opportunity to collaborate with composers John Adams, Elliott Carter, David Fulmer and Steve Reich as well as to record works by Jonathan Dawe and John Zorn. After graduating in 2013, Sam was accepted to the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, receiving the Ruth and Morris Williams Jr. Scholarship while studying with Blair Bollinger, Nitzan Haroz and Matthew Vaughn.

Prior to joining the Singapore Symphony Orchestra in 2016, Sam was appointed Co-Principal of the Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra and has performed with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Sam is a passionate educator, having most recently been invited as a guest artist at the first-ever Alessi Seminar Asia. He has led masterclasses in Singapore, Taiwan and China.



Kenneth Zhong

Mr. Zhong's involvement in the band commenced in his student days, when he first joined the band as a flute player in 1995. His four years in the band set the path for his passion towards music and since then, he has never looked back. His experience was built up from his involvement in the Singapore Wind Symphony (SWS), NIE Symphonic Band and Sembawang Wind Orchestra (SWO), where he currently holds the position of Associate Principal Flute in SWS and the Principal Flute in SWO.

His passion for music led him to become a full-time professional musician in the Singapore Armed Forces Central Band. Mr Zhong managed to attain a ATCL Performing Diploma from Trinity College London in May 2005. He has also worked with various composers and conductors such as Dr. Hardy Mertens, Philip Spark, Frank Ticheli, James Barnes, Dr. Allan McMurray and more, most recent with Maestro Douglas Bostock for the Singapore International Band Festival Conducting Masterclass. In Nov 2008 he also had the honor to work with Col. Michael J.Colburn and Principal Musicians from 'The President's Own' US Marine Band.

In 2003, Mr. Zhong was very honored to be chosen to represent Singapore in the 1st Southeast Asian Youth Orchestra and Wind Ensemble (SAYOWE) held in Thailand, participating in the SAYOWE All-Nations Chamber Ensemble, comprising of the finest musicians in Southeast Asia. He also played in a masterclass for Ms. Ayako Maeda, Principal flute of the Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra organized by Yamaha Music Asia in that year.

He has also performed in masterclasses with **Masazumi Makino**, flute player from **Tokyo Kosei Wind Orchestra**, **Kazuo Tachikawa**, faculty from **Kinitachi College of Music**, **Paul Edmund Davies**, current Principal flute of the **Philharmonia Orchestra** and former Principal Flute of **London Symphony Orchestra** for twenty years.

Being active in the local music scene, he's also a member of the **Singapore Flute Association** and the **Singapore Music Teachers Association** (www.smtasingapore. com). Currently, Mr Zhong is also the flute tutor in schools such as **Singapore American School, Overseas Family School** and several local schools, **Dunman High Junior** and **Senior High, CHIJ Katong Convent, Victoria School, Greenridge Secondary, Chestnut Drive Secondary, Kranji Secondary, Ngee Ann Polytechnic Concert Band and Republic Polytechnic Wind Symphony.**

In 2006 Mr Zhong became a Lillian Burkart artist and currently plays on a 19.5K Gold flute, paired with a J.R Lafin headjoint.



Chang Hong

Chang Hong is the founder of **Hitmaker Global Academy**, a musician & music educator with more than 15 years of teaching and performance experience. She completed her **Graduate Diploma in Clarinet Performance** at the **Yong Siew Toh Conservatory of Music**, the **National University of Singapore** in 2009 on a full scholarship. She studied with **Mr. Ma Yue**, the Principal Clarinetist of **Singapore Symphony Orchestra**. Previously, she attained her **Bachelor of Music with Honors in Clarinet Performance** at same Conservatory on a full scholarship in 2007. Chang Hong has been on the Dean's List when she was in the conservatory and was also a member of the **Conservatory Orchestra** and the **Conservatory Chamber Winds**. She performs regularly at the **Conservatory Concert Hall** and the **Esplanade Concert Hall** and has performed in the master classes of **Colin Lawson** and **Marcel Luxen**. She performs with the **Singapore Symphony Orchestra**, **Malaysian Philharmonic Orchestra** and is a member of **Singapore Lyric Opera** and the lead mentor of **Orchestra of the Music Makers**.

Chang Hong won the first prize for chamber group in The 1st Clarinet Competition in Singapore, and second prize for clarinet solo performance of **The 1st Clarinet Competition in Singapore.**

She started playing the piano at age 4, and she has been playing clarinet since age 9, initially learning with **Mr. Huang Yuanfu**, the Professor of **Beijing Central Conservatory of Music.** She attended the Music Middle School of the **Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing.** While there, she attends numerous clarinet festivals, competitions and master classes and was a two-time finalist at the **International Clarinet Competition, Beijing, China.** She was a member of 4+1 Woodwind quintet and the principal clarinet in the **Youth Symphony Orchestra**, performing in China and Taiwan.

Chang Hong has been teaching clarinet sectionals in over 20 schools and theory students for the past 9 years and has a large following of students who have benefited greatly from her knowledge and passion.


Lu-Min Chew

She also plays regularly with Base Symphony Orchestra including the most recent George Michael Faith and Freedom Concert in 2018.

She has played with a variety of celebrities including Sarah Brightman and Katherine Jenkins, William So, and Eason Chan. As a pit musician, she has played for The Sound of Music (both 2014 and 2017), Onegin, Romeo and Juliet (both with Stuttgart Ballet), Swan Lake (Bolshoi Ballet), as well as numerous Operas including Merry Widow, Tales of Hoffman, Marriage of Figaro, Manon Lescaut, Madame Butterfly, Magic Flute, La Traviata, Carmen, La Boheme, Salome and Cosi fan Tutte, Pagliacci, and Turandot. Aside from being a freelance performer, Lu-min was Head of Strings at the Australian International School Singapore for 9 years. She is currently still teaching at AIS as well as holding the post of String Ensemble Director at SJIIES since 2011.

Lu-min also runs her own private music teaching studio. As a qualified **Suzuki Teacher** she enjoys working with very young children, and has also had experience with working with children who have learning difficulties. Her experience in working in a program for troubled teens in the past has firmly cemented her belief in the important benefits of learning a musical instrument, and the need to make Music Education as fun and as accessible as possible.



Matthias Oestringer

Matthias Oestringer graduated from the Akademie für Tonkunst Darmstadt, Germany with 1st Class honours in Performance (künstlerische Reifeprüfung). Mervyn Goh

Amanda Zhu

Singaporean cellist Amanda Zhu started her music journey at the age of 5 with the piano. She attained her **LRSM in Piano Performance (ABRSM)** at the age of 13, and picked up the cello as a second instrument in the same year. Her interest in the string instrument quickly flourished, and Amanda received her **Diploma in Cello Performance** 2 years later. She went on to pursue her dreams at the **Royal College of Music in London**, with the cello as her principal study, where she graduated with a **Bachelor of Music with Honours.**

During her performance career, Amanda has performed and recorded at prestigious venues such as the Esplanade Concert Hall, Shanghai Concert Hall, Abbey Road Studios, Royal Festival Hall, the Wigmore Hall and Royal Albert Hall in London.
